

This next chapter is about deepening our roots and broadening our reach — creating a Museum that reflects the richness of our shared heritage and stands ready to welcome the generations to come.



5/14 **Massacre Community Memory Coalition**

n the aftermath of the 5/14 massacre, the 5/14 Massacre Community Memory Coalition has become a vital force for remembrance, healing, and transformation. With guidance from Rose Jade Consulting Cooperative, the coalition has co-created a mission, vision, and values that center the voices of victims' families and the broader community.

Through quarterly retreats, affinity group dialogues, and intentional relationship-building, the coalition is confronting the legacies of white supremacist violence while advancing long-term strategies for cultural and systemic change.

A key initiative has been the development of a shared stewardship model for memory work—an approach informed by national best practices and rooted in community input. It began with the respectful gathering of items from the spontaneous memorial at Tops in November 2022. Students from the Patricia H. and Richard E. Garman Art Conservation Department, in collaboration with Museum collections staff, are now focused on the archival care of those materials. The work is expanding to include the collection of oral histories and community-driven objects that speak to lived experiences and the broader context of racial injustice in Buffalo.

As we look ahead, the coalition will deepen its presence in the community this summer gathering stories, building partnerships, and expanding inclusive pathways for participation in this ongoing work of remembrance and repair.



hrough thoughtful acquisitions and contemporary collecting, we are shaping a collection that reflects all of Buffalo—past and present.

Preserving Buffalo's Stories: A Year in Collections & Archives

Connecting with the Past—Digitally

More than 8,300 objects from our collection are now available to explore online through our PastPerfect database. From everyday items to rare artifacts, we're opening our archives to the world. We partnered with the Buffalo & Erie County Public Library to expand access to over 170 local newspapers dating back to 1811, now fully searchable online through Newspapers.com.

Collecting Today's History

This year, we continued building collections that reflect our community's diverse stories and lived experiences. New and ongoing initiatives include:

- 60 Years of Friendship, celebrating Buffalo's bond with Kanazawa, Japan
- Imperial Court of Buffalo Protocol Manual, documenting the local drag community
- Anniversary materials from Bethel A.M.E. Church and the Afro-American Historical Association

Resource Center

ith 16 decades of collecting, over 500,000 objects in our collection, and 33% of our total budget dedicated to their care, the Resource Center is at the heart of preserving Buffalo's rich history and complex history. Currently, only a fraction of our collection is on view. This transformation will change that—opening up access to the treasures within and making them more discoverable, usable, and visible to the public.

Located at 459 Forest Avenue, the Resource Center is the cornerstone of our long-range vision—an ambitious, future-facing investment in access, preservation, and public impact. As the most significant project of our Master Plan, this effort will:

- Preserve and Share the Full Scope of Our Region's
- Create Flexible, Multi-Use Spaces for Community Gathering and Engagement
- Expand Community-Centered and Next-Generation Collecting

- Meet the Growing Demand for Interactive, Inclusive Visitor Experiences
- Strengthen Signature Heritage Events and Cultural

This transformation also deepens our role as stewards. Caring for this extraordinary volume of material—on behalf of the community and for generations to come requires not only space, but resources and a lasting commitment to sustainable collections care.

This project is a vital step in revitalizing Buffalo's heritage and ensuring our history continues to inspire. Together, we can transform the Resource Center into a vibrant, accessible hub for exploration and connection—shaping the future of our shared story.

With new AV systems by Diversified and updated lighting and electrical from Frey Electric, the space now shines brighter and sounds better than ever. Fresh, welcoming furniture from Millington-Lockwood ties it all together, creating a space as comfortable as it is beautiful.

And the results speak for themselves: not only have we created a more dynamic experience for lectures, performances, and museum events, but the newly renovated auditorium has opened new doors—greatly increasing rental income through partnerships with organizations across the community.

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reimagined for a vibrant future-where conversation, connection, and reflection come together in the heart

of our campus.

e're preparing to turn the page on one of the most ambitious chapters in our Master Plan: the restoration and reactivation of the Reinstein Center. With construction expected to begin in 2025, this \$5 million+ project will breathe new life into a long-overlooked part of our campus—transforming it into a vibrant public space that strengthens community ties, expands educational opportunities, and supports long-term financial sustainability.

The Reinstein Center has long been part of our campus story—quietly serving behind the scenes since the early 1990s. Originally built in 1920 as the private home and music studio of Leonard Adams, the building has seen decades of change. A 2016 facility study funded by The John R. Oishei Foundation revealed the growing urgency: though just 6,000 square feet, the Reinstein Center accounted for over a quarter of our critical capital needs.

This transformation will preserve the historic Adams House to State Historic Preservation Office standards, while introducing a new, accessible addition that triples usable space. Together, they'll host programs, workshops, and events for up to 100 guests, with expanded capacity for youth education, intergenerational engagement, and community gatherings. A new catering kitchen and support space will also enhance hospitality offerings campus-wide.

Upgraded pathways, lighting, and signage will connect the Reinstein Center to Delaware Park and the Jesse Kregel Bike Trail—redefining how people experience the Museum, inside and out.

Community Impact:

- A flexible indoor venue for field trips, summer camps, and public programming
- Expanded initiatives like the Memory Café for individuals with memory loss and their caregivers
- Strengthened signature events including the Cherry Blossom Festival and Maker's Market
- Meaningful revenue growth through increased visitation, rentals, and hospitality

Already, we project at least a 15% increase in visitation, along with a doubling of both catering and programming revenue streams. This entrepreneurial project represents a bold step forward—combining historic preservation with a sustainable, community driven future.
